Think about contract law, ownership, sale and purchase and so on. In addition to this it is of great importance to have national and international knowledge.

Art & Law – Anyway, art & law is an art on itself. The most common subject of discussion in art and law is the sale and purchase agreement and in particular error ("dwaling"). Art is not always what it seems. For example the

case of the

The client exchanged in 2013 a painting of Jacob Jordaens with related book with an Art Dealer for antique Coptic fragments. These art objects were both estimated to be worth an amount of \in 650.000,- but after valuation by a sworn expert the Coptic fragments proved not be worth much!

Of course not only the sale and purchase agreement is subject of discussion. Often stolen or falisified art objects are topics for debate just like fraud, taxation, lending art and so on.
